

BUILDING AND/OR USE OF AI SYSTEMS

September 22 | 2025

On September 22, in cooperation with Novartis and the U.S. Embassy, AmCham Slovakia organized a unique workshop focused on human-machine collaboration in medicine. The workshop, moderated by Samuel Hollis, featured biomedical engineering expert Prof. Amina Qutub of the University of Texas at San Antonio.

Prof. Qutub introduced pioneering projects including AI for Trauma Care (iRemedyACT), a system trained on over 400,000 data points to support real-time decision-making in trauma settings,

as well as her team's advances in machine learning for leukemia subtype classification and therapeutic discovery. She also explored applications for extreme environments, from military medicine to space healthcare.


Discussions emphasized the importance of human-in-the-loop design - AI models that complement, rather than replace, medical expertise. The workshop highlighted how early adoption of validated AI systems could optimize healthcare resources while enhancing patient care on a global scale.

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E-INVOICING IN SLOVAKIA – FROM LAW TO PRACTICE

AmCham Slovakia, in cooperation with PwC Slovakia, hosted a business breakfast focused on the upcoming shift to mandatory electronic invoicing and real-time transaction reporting. The event offered members early access to insights from policymakers and regulators, including experts from the Ministry of Finance and the Financial Directorate of the Slovak Republic.

Discussions centered on the legislative framework, technical rollout, and the practical impact on businesses. Speakers highlighted both challenges and opportunities, stressing the importance of company readiness ahead of the January 2027

launch. European trends and the EU's ViDA initiative provided broader context, showing how Slovakia's transition fits into a wider digitalization effort.

In Slovakia, mandatory e-invoicing and transaction reporting to the Financial Administration is expected to take effect from January 1, 2027 for domestic transactions. E-invoicing has the potential to simplify processes, reduce costs, and improve financial oversight. The breakfast underscored how this reform, though complex, is a unique chance to modernize operations and align with Europe's digital future.
