In 2021 Mark Leonard, a leading authority on international relations. published a book with an ominous title The Age of Unpeace. Leonard claims that since the collapse of communism there has been a continuous push for breaking down trade barriers and integrating the world's economy via improved transport and communication networks as well as the internet.



Vital cooperation on solving global threats to the long term survival of humanity, such as pandemics and climate change, has almost stopped.

New technologies have made our travelling, calls, and data transfers both cheaper and faster, thus improving the quality

of our lives. However, the same technologies have become potent weapons for new kinds of war. We can see it daily on social media or read about so called hybrid wars in the news. While trying to understand why globalization has not delivered on its promise to make the world safer and more prosperous, Leonard does not give up hope for a better world and explores how we can devise a better future.

Tragically, months after the book's publication "unpeace" has turned into classic warfare and ushered in an era in which a clear distinction between war and peace can be made easily even by children.

We keep imposing new sanctions, are quickly rearming our societies, and becoming overwhelmed by continuous migrant inflows.
